ABOUT OUR 2021 GRANTS

ArtsFund distributes grants in several ways, including our keystone allocations grants and a variety of targeted funds. Since its founding, ArtsFund has strengthened the community by supporting over 650 arts organizations in Washington state with more than \$100 million in grants.

KEYSTONE ALLOCATIONS GRANTS

Our flagship, annual grant program. Through allocations, ArtsFund issues general operating grants for cultural nonprofits that present or produce a season of arts and cultural programs.

YOUTH ARTS OPPORTUNITY FUND

Aims to increase access to and participation in meaningful, robust, sustained arts experiences for youth with low socioeconomic status or who have historically lacked access to arts programs

NONPROFIT COMMUNITY RECOVERY GRANTS

In 2021, ArtsFund partnered with the Washington State Department of Commerce to administer nearly \$11 million in Nonprofit Community Recovery (NCR) grants. These pandemic recovery grants were distributed to nonprofits across Washington state operating within four focus areas: arts, culture, science, and heritage; neighborhood development; sports and recreation; and veterans services. Grant recipients cited the top uses for funding as staff salaries, programming, rent/mortgage, and reopening education and awareness communications.

A well-trained and effective board of directors is essential to a nonprofit's success. ArtsFund introduced its Board Leadership Training program in 1999 to teach committed volunteers to be highly effective board members. In 22 years, more than 800 individuals have graduated from the program.



ADVOCACY

Advocating for arts and cultural on the local, statewide, and national levels is a core component of ArtsFund's mission.

BUILDING FOR THE ARTS

In 2021, our advocacy initiative Building for the Arts (BFA)—a program with the State to fund arts capital projects around Washington—experienced a major success. This cycle marked an increase in funding to this important program for the first time in 30 years, making more support for capital projects available to more arts and cultural groups.



COVID CULTURAL IMPACT STUDY: CHARTING THE STATE OF WASHINGTON'S CULTURAL NONPROFITS

Washington's cultural organizations have been deeply impacted by the pandemic. Since March 2020, ArtsFund has been collecting data and information to quantify these impacts. Throughout 2021, we dedicated significant resources to creating a first-of-its-kind COVID Cultural Impact Study, which was released in 2022.

Among other impacts, many organizations were forced to furlough staff or reduce hours and pay, deeply impacting the cultural workforce that power these organizations. Revitalizing those institutions are an integral part of our state's pandemic recovery because they are central to our communities.

We are not at the tail-end of a pandemic - we are at the beginning of a structural transformation.



COVID CULTURAL IMPACT STUDY

METHODOLOGY

Utilizing data from both cultural organizations and Washington residents, the COVID Cultural Impact Study analyzes the depth of the challenges the pandemic has created for Washington's art and culture sector and illuminates the support necessary to revitalize these integral institutions.





SPOTLIGHT: JIM TUNE




After serving in ArtsFund leadership roles for a quarter of a century, James "Jim" Tune stepped down from his role as Chair of the ArtsFund Foundation Board. Jim has been a dedicated leader and advocate for ArtsFund since 1997 when he first joined the ArtsFund Board of Trustees. Since then, he has held nearly every leadership role available, including leading the organization as President & CEO from 2005-2012.

- 14 years serving on the ArtsFund Board of Trustees (1997-2011)
- 11 years serving on the ArtsFund Foundation Board (2010-2021)
- 9 years serving on the ArtsFund Advisory Council (2013-present)
- 7 years serving as ArtsFund President & CEO (2005-2012)

During his tenure as CEO, in addition to raising tens of millions of dollars for arts and cultural nonprofits, Jim helped add \$3.5 million to the ArtsFund endowment and expand ArtsFund's reputation. As Chair of the Foundation Board, Jim has been a thoughtful and fastidious steward of the organization's resources. Jim's contributions to our arts and cultural community are impossible to quantify. Our region is indisputably stronger and more vibrant thanks to his 25 years of service, and we are grateful that Jim and his wife Kathy continue to support ArtsFund as annual contributors.

SPOTLIGHT: JAY GREEN



Following decades of leadership at ArtsFund, Joshua (Jay) Green III retired from the ArtsFund Foundation Board. As some of ArtsFund's longest standing supporters, Jay and his wife Pamela were a fixture at community gatherings even before the organization was known as "ArtsFund," attending the inaugural event of the newly named Corporate Council for the Arts in 1975.

Thanks to the personal contributions of Jay and Pamela, along with the Joshua Green Foundation, ArtsFund has able to build up the Puget Sound arts and cultural sector over the past five decades. Jay's deep understanding of the region and ongoing engagement with ArtsFund and countless other nonprofits has had an unequivocal impact on our community. We are grateful for Jay's tremendous guidance and support over the years. He is in no small part responsible for the strong foundation we now stand on as we look to the future.


