A Program with a History of Success

Since its inception in 1991, the <u>Building for the Arts</u> program has granted \$129 million in state capital construction funds to 262 arts projects in 30 counties across Washington State. Thanks to administration by the Department of Commerce and a citizens advisory board, only projects that have demonstrated sound planning, fiscal solvency, and an ability to raise substantial funds locally are recommended for funding. Reimbursement funds may not exceed 33% of total project costs, nor may they exceed \$2 million total per organization.

This biennium's Building for the Arts program recommends 32 capital projects requesting \$18M. The projects span 14 counties and 17 legislative districts. All projects have demonstrated sound planning and fiscal solvency.



Building Significant Economic Impact

Labor Income Impacts

The 2023-2025 Building for the Arts program's request of \$18 million in the capital budget is only 16.4% of the \$109.5 million total cost of capital projects proposed, and is a modest investment in the returns it will bring to the state.

In addition to quality of life contributions these projects will bring to their communities, they will impact the state's economy through tax revenue and job creation. With construction completion required by the end of the biennium cycle, these projects are providing jobs in their communities now. When construction is complete, arts organizations and their patrons spur business and jobs in service industries, including in restaurants, hotels, and transportation.

Field Arts & Events Hall

Expected completion date: Early Q3 2023

About the Project: The Port Angeles Waterfront Center (PAWC), a community based 501(c)3 non-profit is constructing a two-story performing arts and community conference center (Field Arts & Events Hall) on a portion of a nearly 70,000 sq. ft. parcel of harbor-side property it owns in downtown Port Angeles, Washington.

PAWC seeks \$2,000,000 in reimbursable funding for eligible project design and construction costs associated with the building's performance support space including dressing rooms, green room, wardrobe room, stage restroom, and offices (Level I), pre-function lobby space (Level I & Level 2), an art gallery space (Level I), and lobby restrooms (Level I & Level 2).

Field Arts & Events Hall has been designed to be a highly versatile multipurpose space that can accommodate a range of performance types including music, dance, drama, lecture, and spoken word. The auditorium will also be equipped with a large format digital display that can be used to screen cinema, documentaries, or stream live events.

The construction of Field Arts & Events Hall represents the most important economic development effort currently underway anywhere on the Olympic Peninsula. The first

of a series of buildings, Field Arts & Events Hall is the centerpiece of a \$140-plus million business development and infrastructure upgrade that when complete, will redefine the Port Angeles waterfront, arts scene, and tourism industry for the next fifty years.



About the Organization: Designed as "A home for arts and events that brings people together and strengthens our community", Field Arts & Events Hall will consist of a two-tier 500-seat state-of-the-art auditorium and conference and event space that directly overlooks Port Angeles harbor. Construction is nearing completion with programing scheduled to begin late summer of 2023.

Tacoma Armory Performance Renovation

Expected completion date: March 2025

About the Project: Originally built in 1909, the Armory sits at South 11th Street and South Yakima Avenue in Tacoma's Hilltop neighborhood. This is an important site for the South Sound community, particularly for the under-served residents of the Hilltop. Tacoma Arts Live is hard at work building relationships in the neighborhood to share the building, not as a "fortress" but as a resource for community-based arts, culture, and civic connections. During 2022, Tacoma Arts Live has brought great artistic performances, large-scale immersive exhibits, community-based festivals, and more. In that time, we have already served more than 65,000 visitors at the Armory.

The Armory requires significant improvements, and with BFA funding, we will increase energy efficiency, improve patron safety, ADA access, acoustics, and aesthetics, and boost overall functionality. All with the goal of increasing community service and extending the facility's life to serve another 100 years.

All of our matching funds are in place, and no additional funds are needed beyond BFA grant funds.





About the Organization: Since 1979, Tacoma Arts Live has provided the South Sound community with world-class and regional performing arts events, civic activities, festivals, venue management, social justice events, and highly impactful educational programs. Annually, we serve approximately 250,000 visitors throughout the South Sound region, whether in our own facilities or traveling to partner sites.

Roxy Theater Phase 2: Renovation with Energy Upgrades

Expected completion date: June 2024

About the Project: Fire Mountain Arts Council is completing the renovation of the Roxy Theater in Morton. The project addresses urgent, long-needed and long-planned improvements which will ensure that the Roxy's cultural programs will serve the community and its youth for decades to come. Renovation includes a new insulated roof, an energy-efficient HVAC system, LED stage lighting, remodeled front entry (all already competed), and construction of the 2-story, 2802 sq. ft., backstage/multi-purpose addition to the theater. The existing Roxy facility has no backstage, no ADA-accessible dressing rooms nor greenroom, and no weather-tight entrances to the stage. Much more than just reducing power demands and greatly facilitating productions, the new accessible backstage

will enable mobility-challenged children and adults to access rehearsal spaces, costuming areas, and an arts and crafts classroom. The Roxy Theater in the heart of downtown Morton—with its welcoming new look, its uniqueness as an historic, smalltown theater, and its quality cultural programming—will help drive the future economic wellbeing of eastern Lewis County.

Imagine Children's Museum Expansion Project

Expected completion date: Summer 2024

About the Project: Imagine Children's Museum's capital project is creating a bigger and better outdoor education and play area that will increase hands-on outside education and artistic performances. The project will renovate our existing rooftop play area, the 9149 sq. ft. Rooftop Adventure, and enlarge it by adding 3,000 sq. ft. of new construction converting a former rooftop parking area into additional outdoor exhibits and program space.

The project will renovate the existing rooftop play area with overall repair, paint, and structural upgrades to address years of weathering and exuberant use. The life-size Stegosaurus skeleton and accompanying exhibit area will be refurbished and re-interpreted with the latest paleontological science. The Rooftop Rhythms stage will be rebuilt to accommodate larger and more frequent outdoor performances, and the area's large-scale instruments will be repaired or replaced.

Inspired by the success of the existing area, the Museum will seamlessly expand its outdoor education area by 40%, converting an existing rooftop parking area into an outdoor classroom and programming space for cultural performances, science activities and demonstrations, group outdoor games, and large-scale art collaborations. The addition of outdoor lighting will extend the daily usage and open the possibility of evening events. A new shade/rain structure will ensure four-season use of the outdoor classroom. The old and new areas will be tied together with consistent theming, improved fencing, and tiles of recycled material that provide fall protection - especially important for visitors with special needs and mobility issues. In addition, the area will be enhanced with new interpretive signage for the rooftop exhibits and new exterior building signage.

About the Organization: Imagine Children's Museum is a family-friendly Museum dedicated to enriching children's lives through playful learning and embracing the rich diversity of the Puget Sound region. Offering three floors of unbeatable play spaces for children ages I-I2 and their families, Imagine Children's Museum recently opened a \$25 million expansion including state-of-the-art, interactive exhibits to inspire a lifelong love of learning through play. The new exhibits showcase the Pacific Northwest, the Puget Sound and Port of Everett; an engineering gallery; a tinker shop where children can learn to use real tools; an exhibit about woodlands; an exhibit about package distribution; a marine ecosystems exhibit; and a few others. These complement the museum's original exhibits, which include an Everett Transit bus, a miniature locomotive track, and a water works area.

Paramount Theatre Capital Improvements

About the Project: Seattle Theatre Group's proposed project includes refurbishing theatre seats, which have not been upgraded in over 25 years, and upgrades to stage and pit lighting systems. After hosting upwards of ten million audience members, the desperately needed seat refurbishment will include new foam and spring support, upholstery, seatbacks, and armrests for all 2,875 seats in the Paramount Theatre auditorium. As new and innovative venues open across the city, the Paramount theatre must have upgraded stage and pit lighting equipment to remain competitive and able to house high-tech performances. With the ever-changing landscape of Seattle's downtown, these improvements are crucial to ensuring STG's historic theatres remain vibrant for our communities and continue to bring audiences to Seattle to experience the arts.

Idaho Central Spokane Valley Performing Arts Center Capital Project

Expected completion date: Occupancy, May 2022; Grand Opening July 2024

About the Project: The Idaho Central Spokane Valley Performing Arts Center (ICSVPAC) is a \$48M state-of-the-art, completely ADA compliant facility along the Spokane River and I-90 corridor, serving a population from Missoula, MT to Moses Lake, WA. The 59,000 square foot facility will house a 480+ seat Main Stage Theatre, a 200-seat flexible Studio Theatre, an Acting Conservatory for area youth, classrooms, recording studio, as well as event/business meeting space for 400 including a caterer's kitchen, and 300 free parking spaces. Groundbreaking took place August of 2022, with a Grand Opening in summer 2024. The ICSVPAC is a legacy project for professional performing arts in Eastern Washington, as well as giving the community a multi-use space. This stunning building will not only benefit

the Inland Northwest artistically and culturally, but will have a significant positive economic impact on hospitality/tourism.

About the Organization:

Plans for the ICSVPAC were sparked by the success of the 501(c)3 non-profit Spokane Valley Summer Theatre (SVST) and educational Conservatory



for students in grades 2-12. It is the only professional performing arts company in the region, and will become the resident theater company at the new ICSVPAC facility. Since its founding in 2016, SVST has produced high quality summer musical theatre, while setting new attendance and revenue records annually, including drawing 1/3 of its patrons from outside Spokane/Spokane Valley, and 15% from out-of-state.

SIFF Uptown Theatre Renovation Project

Expected completion date: July 2023

About the Project: SIFF is working on the final phase of its \$2.2M renovation project to rejuvenate its historic UptownTheater. The theater requires crucial repairs to improve safety and enhance the theater experience. First built in 1926, the Uptown is a 14,400 sq. ft. arthouse cinema featuring 3 screens, serving over 135,000 guests annually through film programming, rentals, and the Seattle International Film Festival. The final phase of renovations will include repair and stabilization of the Uptown's historic marquee, new security-enhanced and ADA accessible exterior doors, exterior signage, painting, and fabrication of anti-theft film poster cases. SIFF's fully renovated Uptown

Theater will be the premier filmviewing facility in the Seattle area for Washington State residents, students, tourists, and industry professionals, and film lovers from around the world.

film arts organization in the region. 

Seattle Rep's Renovations for Accessibility and Equity

Expected completion date: Summer 2024

About the Project: Seattle Rep is renovating our 1983 facility to improve accessibility and equity. The renovations will provide necessary upgrades to our 696-seat Bagley Wright Theater, lobby restrooms, and box office area to meet current ADA standards, as well as streamlining our main lobby staircase and the Bagley Wright mezzanine to provide greater circulation space for patrons. The project will impact approximately 21,000 square feet and will also include the creation of a single-stall, all-gender/family restroom and a wellness room for patrons to use for nursing, prayer, or a break from sensory stimuli. These renovations will make our theater more accessible to patrons who use mobility devices and more comfortable and equitable for all.

Orcas Center Renovation, Phase 2

Expected completion date: December 31, 2025

About the Project: Orcas Center is diving into Phase 2 of a much-needed renovation, with a set of projects that will collectively bring the Orcas Island-based performing arts and cultural community center's 40+ year-old facility up-to-date, and make it safer, more energy-efficient, and - most importantly - more financially sustainable in the long term. Included in the comprehensive project list are the installation of a 114.7 kW direct gridtied photovoltaic (PV) solar array, a complete package of LED lighting for its Black Box theater as well as more LED instruments for its primary Center Stage theater, and the final build-out of its brand new dance studio. All of the line items in this Renovation-Phase 2

project lead to better, more comfortable, more enjoyable, and much less cost-intensive spaces in which the local Orcas Island community can create and partake in the year-round consumption of art.

Jon and Mary Shirley Fabrication Studios

Expected completion date: September 2023

About the Project: Cornish College of the Arts is requesting Building for the Arts funding to complete a major renovation and expansion of its fabrication and design studios at the College's Main Campus Center in South Lake Union. This transformed and expanded maker space will be renamed the Jon and Mary Shirley Fabrication Studio after a lead gift of \$2 million for this project was awarded by the Jon and Mary Shirley Foundation. This project will have an immediate impact on the Cornish campus, providing undergraduates

and continuing education students the art-making space, technology, and support systems needed to practice a range of mediums, on a range of scales. The exterior of this project will also create a dynamic new campus walkway on the corner of Denny Way and Terry Avenue with views into working portions of the fabrication studios.

Founded in 1914, Cornish College of the Arts is a nationally recognized leader in the study of visual and performing arts offering undergraduate degrees in Art, Dance, Design, Film, Interior Architecture, Drawing, Painting, Photography, Printmaking, Sculpture, Music, Performance Production, and Theater. Cornish also offers a range of continuing education programming through the School for Creative Arts and engages the public through

ARTE NOIR at Midtown Square

Expected completion date: Fall 2023

About the Project: ARTE NOIR is Black art and culture space that anchors retail businesses at the new Midtown Square complex in the heart of Seattle's Central District; an area that has suffered high displacement over the past two decades. Returning a sense of place to the community through Black art and culture, ARTE NOIR hosts the Black-led nonprofit Onyx Fine Arts Collective/Gallery Onyx, which serves over 400 Black artists from the Pacific Northwest. The remaining space is dedicated to the sale of items created by over 40 Black makers. ARTE NOIR successfully opened to the public on September 17, 2022, to a warm community-wide reception that brought over 500 people through the doors. In the first 3 months of operation, the gallery has sold over \$30,000 in works (70% of which goes to artists); and ARTE NOIR has returned over \$40,000 in net revenue to artists whose items are sold in the retail space. Our mission is to serve our community by creating revenue-generating opportunities for highly displaced Black artists. We are accomplishing this goal and creating a new reparative model for community development, ownership, and opportunity in a community that has suffered high displacement and cultural erasure.





About the Organization: ARTE NOIR was formed in May 2021 as an online publication and incorporated as a nonprofit on July 1, 2022. The organization's leadership includes a 6-member board of directors, 2 full time, 1 three-quarter time, and 1 half time staff. The organization continues to produce a monthly publication highlighting Black art and culture from the African diaspora, and the retail space and gallery is open to the public 5 days a week.

The Pickford on Grand

Expected completion date: December 2023

About the Project: The Pickford Film Center is constructing a second venue in downtown Bellingham. The Pickford on Grand is a 6,500sf building that will house two 70-seat cinemas, one 20-seat jewelbox cinema and a lobby large enough for community events. All are ADA compliant. The Pickford Film Center purchased this building at 105 Grand Ave. after searching for a replacement space for its Limelight Cinema, a second venue that had to be permanently closed during the pandemic. The Pickford on Grand will show films 365 days and nights every year and will enhance downtown (much as our flagship venue around the corner does) by bringing audiences downtown to eat, drink and shop in the surrounding neighborhood. The project rehabilitates a shabby building that has not been improved since the 1950s and improves downtown safety by keeping pedestrians on the streets day and night.

About the Organization:

The Pickford Film Center was founded as the Whatcom Film Association in 1998 and is the only independent nonprofit movie theater in Whatcom County. The Pickford shows first-run independent films, repertory film programs and curated series as well as producing film festivals including Doctober, the largest documentary festival in the Northwest and Bellingham Children's Film Festival. The Pickford is also home to the Treaty Day Film Festival, Cascadia Women's International Film Festival, and Bleedingham. Doc-ED, a program that offers free tickets and transportation to all Whatcom middle schools served 3,100 students in 2022. Pre-pandemic, with three screens, the Pickford sold ~100,000 tickets a year.

KNKX Next Campaign

Expected completion date: May 2023

About the Project: Pacific Public Media (dba KNKX 88.5 FM) is building a new home in Seattle - 7,8883 sq. ft. of space in the Madore Building. Located between Pike Place Market and the waterfront, KNKX's new home will expand its service as a provider of music, arts and culture, news and civic engagement; be more accessible to listeners; and will bring an aging technology platform into the 21st century.

The new home will include broadcast studios, production studios, a video editing room and Studio X - a state of the art performance space for concerts and live studio sessions with local and national musicians. In addition to inviting people in for music and conversations, KNKX is also excited to help activate nearby spaces through partnerships in the community. KNKX hopes to bring jazz and blues to the waterfront park in partnership with the Friends of the Waterfront and produce arts and culture events in partnership with the Pike Place Market.

About the Project: Experience Learning Community, dba Museum of Pop Culture (MoPOP) is an interdisciplinary performing arts, visual arts, and cultural facility built in 2000. Due to the 22-year age of the building, our facility is currently reaching end of life on many systems as well as experiencing growing pains from reaching beyond the original usage capacity expected 20 years ago. This project is specifically asking for funding to pay for the second phase of our 20-year Refresh Campaign. Projects within this phase include: dimmer rack control system and module upgrade for our main performance area, Sky Church; compact storage to increase space for our visual arts collection which includes many 2D works; ticketing kiosks and access control gates to meet best practice for visitor safety; and various IT infrastructure upgrades.

The dimmer rack control system and module upgrade will give us the ability to convert systems to LED lighting which will increase the energy efficiency and lower long-term costs. The increased storage capacity for the Collections department allows us to accept more 2D art into the collection (such as posters, photographs, tickets, etc.). The IT upgrades are focused on the stability and security of our systems. The ticketing kiosks and access control gates are

based on audience movement and security needs that have been identified through the Infrastructure Survey Security and Resilience (ISSR) Report conducted by the Department of Homeland Security. The reason for this is to increase the safety of visitors as well as the efficiency of the box office and ticketing process.



About the Organization: MoPOP reaches nearly three-quarters of

a million people each year, in our mixed-use cultural facility. It contains the Sound + Vision Theatre, a fixed seat film venue that hosts more than 30 screenings a year plus daily showings of local nonprofit curated content. MoPOP boasts 13 galleries that investigate the importance of pop culture history across music, costume design, film and television, video games, and more. Our educational and public programs focus on using the arts as a way to cultivate creativity from creative writing classes, to music performance programs, film screenings, and art workshops.

Green Light Centennial Campaign - Phase 2

Expected completion date: April 2026, Lincoln Theatre's 100th Anniversary

About the Project: The Green Light Campaign will install fire suppression and updated HVAC in the Lincoln Theatre, preserving life in the event of a fire and moving

the theatre off natural gas heat to an electric heat pump, lowering monthly expense and the Theatre's Carbon Footprint. Older buildings, constructed before modern fire safety requirements were established, must be made safe for the public. Designing fire safety systems to ensure the maximum protection of significant Lincoln Theatre historic building features must be accomplished within the context of the absolute need to protect life from fire and its effects. One of the tools in lowering a buildings carbon footprint is improving the HVAC system. Currently the Lincoln Theatre has a boiler heating system designed in 1926. Transforming to an HVAC system will also provide cooling as well as heat, cleaning the air in the facility, which is an important part of COVID safety. With refreshed air traveling through ionized air systems, the upgraded system will improve air quality and safety for audiences.



About the Organization: For ninety-six years, the Lincoln Theatre has graced the streets of old downtown Mount Vernon, Washington which is the county seat and largest city in Skagit County. The Theatre offers a bountiful selection of events from live theatre and musical performances to meaningful film and educational forums on topics important to the community and County government. Considered by many as the heart of downtown, the Lincoln has also led social dialogue through its diverse and inclusive programming, including tributes to the Hispanic community, farming community, and LGBTQ community.
